

Jeff Spencer has obtained permission to look for E grandiflorum in a reserve near Thompson Lake. We also hope to see Cryptostylis ovata, Elythranthera emarginata & Prasophyllum drummondii.



# ORCHID DISPLAY ALBANY WILDFLOWER FESTIVAL – SEPTEMBER 2000 by PAT JOHNS

It was left to my husband Peter, and me, to stage the orchid exhibit at this years Albany Wildflower Festival, and a hard act it was to follow in the footsteps of earlier people – well known orchidists Ron Heberle and Mary Sherwood, a keen local orchid enthusiast, lately deceased. Due to an unusual season – a very late break and lack of spring rain, we found only 41 different specimens, plus a dozen or so Caladenia hybrids, as opposed to 60 specimens last year – earlier times have seen as many as 80. We spent 5 full days prior to the festival covering an area roughly bounded by the Pallinup River to the east, Borden Cranbrook and Mt Barker to the north, Denmark to the west

and the South Coast. Flowers were reasonably abundant and of good size in the western areas, but the further east and north one went from Albany, the smaller and sparser they became. We found 17 Caladenia species, some worthy of mention - C filifera, C longicauda ssp eminens, C plicata, and C pulchra. Most interesting were two completely green Drakonorchis barbarossa. There were 1 Cyanicula, 3 Diuris, 3 Drakea, 1 Elythranthera (brunonis), Leptoceras menziesii, Lyperanthus serratus, 1 Microtis (Media ssp media), 1 Paracaleana nigrita, 1 Prasophyllum elatum, 5 Pterostylis (including turfosa), 1 Pyrochis nigricans, and 5 Thelymitra. Lets hope, for our sake, and especially the farming community, that next year has a normal rainfall.

# FIELD TRIP TO FRANKLAND OCTOBER 21-22 by MARY HARRIS

Thirtyfive people, including several country members, and Robert & Eva Breiner, our German orchid enthusiasts, gathered at the Frankland Caravan Park on October 21. Some car-pooling reduced the number of cars to 13 before we started, and under grey skies & light showers, in convoy behind Jim Parry, our local trip leader.

The first stop was an area of unallocated Crown land on the edge of town. Here we found Caladenia dourine, polychroma, flava ssp flava, uliginosa ssp uliginosa, marginata, longicauda ssp eminens, caesarea ssp caesarea and lobata, Elythranthera emarginata & brunonis, Thelymitra antennifera & aff macrophylla (not out due to the windy weather), Drakonorchis barbarossa, and Diuris laxiflora. Also one Gould's Monitor Lizard, sunning himself, and posing for the cameras. We then moved on to the lunch stop on the Frankland-Cranbrook Road, about 28km east of Frankland. This area gave us Caladenia falcata, Lyperanthus serratus, Drakonorchis barbarossa, Elythranthera emarginata, Thelymitra crinita, aff macrophylla, once again not open, pauciflora in seed and benthamiana in bud.

The weather was still cool with showers as we travelled via the back roads to private property on the corner of the Kojonup-Frankland & Boyup Brook-Cranbrook Roads.

This was quite productive and lengthy discussions ensued over the identity of the Prasophyllums found, the final consensus being ovale, fimbria & gracile.

Thelymitra benthamiana was open enough to

show that some had spots and others were plain yellow. Other *Thelymitras* found were aff macrophylla, crinita & antennifera. Also found

were Caladenia flava ssp flava, longicauda ssp eminens, polychroma & macrostylis. Here also was Elythranthera brunonis & emarginata, and an albino emarginata that created lots of photo shots. Lyperanthus serratus was common, very healthy plants. Also present were Drakonorchis barbarossa, Diuris laxiflora, & Pterostylis recurva. This site was the last of the day, & the group dispersed, some of the country people returning home, and Stuart & I back to Kojonup. Sunday saw a smaller group gather at Frankland, in slightly better weather, for a half day before returning to Perth. Led by the intrepid Noel Clarke, we headed down Nornalup Rd to a small granite rock. This stop gave us Caladenia plicata, brownii, flava ssp flava & ensata (we think), Diuris longifolia, Elythranthera brunonis, Thelymitra benthamiana in bud, Pterostylis aff turfosa (p. 376), Paracaleana nigrita and Drakea glyptodon.

The next stop was quite close, this time a much larger granite rock. Found here were Caladenia macrostylis, plicata, ensata, longicauda ssp eminens, brownii and flava with white dorsal sepals and petals, very attractive.

We also found 2 hybrids, C flava x C latifolia and C flava x C marginata. Others found were Elythranthera brunonis, Cyrtostylis, Corybas & Eriochilus in seed, Cryptostylis ovata leaves, Diuris longifolia, Paracaleana nigrita, Thelymitra aff macrophylla and Pterostylis aff turfosa (p 376).

By this time it was midday so we headed back onto Muir Hwy then west to the Frankland River crossing where there had been a burn. We had lunch here, then spent quite q while searching. Here we found Caladenia flava ssp flava, longicauda ssp eminens, lobata, marginata and ensata, Cyanicula gemmata, Pyrites nigricans, Elythranthera brunonis and Thelymitra aff macrophylla & benthamiana in bud.

It was now 2.45, so the group split up, most returning home. However Margaret requested some help in identifying a Caladenia some 20km west of the bridge, so several of us followed her down to this spot. The kangaroo paws on this section of road were stunning as were the bright orange Hibbertia. Margaret's spot was low swampy vegetation, though not wet at this time. The Caladenias she had seen were almost certainly hybrids, probably C longicauda ssp eminens x with a pink Caladenia producing large flowers, very long pink fringes and maroon tips on the labellum, very photogenic. Also here we saw Diuris laxiflora, Elythranthera brunonis and dozens of Thelymitra aff macrophylla, the little bits of

flower we could see was a pale greyish blue, different from the usual clear blue. The end of a busy weekend, many thanks to Jim parry for a well organised trip. A pity it has been so dry, the orchid numbers were down, but next season will be better. The BBQ and audiovisual when the power came on were excellent. Thanks Eve & Jim.

# PEACEFUL BAY FIELD TRIP SEPTEMBER 30-OCTOBER 2, 2000 by DONNA WAJON

Eddy and I drove down to Peaceful Bay on Saturday morning. It was raining when we left but the further south we got the brighter and clearer it became. We arrived right on the dot of 11:00 at the meeting place when most of the group had arrived the night before.

Maggie lead a surprisingly large group of 35 people, 17 cars, which was reduced the next day when several people car-pooled.

The first day of the weekend we spent in the Williams Bay National Park area and made 5 stops. Fay and Clive Malcolm and Sam and Jean Brenton opened their properties to us and showed us some orchids new to this reporter.

We couldn't have asked for better weather, even the wind wasn't that bad. The mozzies in the evening were thick and biting and the cold night was made cosy and warm by the campfire. The evening slide show put on by Noel put a nice ending to a long day.

The second day we travelled between Mandalay Beach Road to the west, North Walpole Road to the North and Kent River Siding Road to the east and made 5 stops.

The orchids were few and far between and as usual we were about to get into cars and head off to a new spot when someone finds a new orchid and everyone runs to see it and take photos. Our lunch stop was recently burned and thousand of eriochilus scabra ssp scabra were found. One stop was not what was expected, the road was closed so the dedicated and determined hiked (2K) to find a rock. Many orchids were seen along the track but the rock was not reached. The area was much drier than usual and lots of trees had been blown down.

The third day we all went our separate ways. In the morning a small group went to a very good spot at the end of Williams road in Peaceful Bay. There we saw a single, magnificent, dark pink, double header Caladenia applanata erubescens, thousand of Cryptostylis ovata in bud, hundreds of Diuris amplissima and fifty Corybas despectans (seeded).

The sighting list was sent to Steve Phillips for recording into the database. I wish to thank everyone for helping to fill out the forms.

# TALK BY DON MANNERS ON GROWING NATIVE ORCHIDS

Don used a u-beaut laptop controlled system to talk about his experiences growing native orchids. It allowed him to use digital photography and set his talk up as a computer file. (Maybe the Group needs the same system). He led off with the thought that we could be doing the wrong thing by rescuing the orchids from under the bulldozer and trying to grow them in pots. Perhaps the better way is to

transplant those threatened with destruction by development to an adjacent similar area. Pot culture has its limits, you are dealing with a few plants only and their long-term survival is unsure.

Before rescuing any plants OBTAIN THE NECESSARY PERMISSION. If it is private land be sure you get the written permission of the owner. Don't forget the permit from

CALM. Under no circumstances touch any declared rare flora – that is if you don't want to be prosecuted.

When collecting orchids note the soil and flora types at the location. The tubers could be Imeter down. Genus such as *Diuris, Pterostylis & Prasophyllum* tubers are close to the surface. Try to get the whole plant with its tubers.

It is essential to maintain the beneficial fungus to successfully grow native orchids. In *Caladenias* the fungus appears to be in the section near ground level. When potting make sure that the soil is maintained round the collar, always using some of the old potting mix from the top of the pot or soil from the top if the specimen being potted is fresh from the bush.

In pots the tubers gravitate to the bottom. To overcome this it is necessary to repot and place the tuber back towards the top. It is also necessary to repot to maintain the vigour of the plant.

To increase your collection you can germinate seedlings successfully in the parent pot. The stages required are: -

- Pollinate by hand using different plants if possible. You can use a paintbrush for this action.
- When the seed pod is ready to burst open place a plastic bag over the pod so that the seed will fall into the parent plant's pot.
- Water the pot by soaking it in water such that there is no run off to wash the seed away. Keep watering the plant; do not let it dry out.
- 4. After the following season the grass like seedlings should be ready for transplanting into their own or community pots.

Don then gave a demonstration of repotting *C* pectinata. He then gave the pots to members who were willing to try growing them on. Thanks Don for a very informative talk.
