WANOSCG MEETING MINUTES **GENERAL MEETING 20 JUNE 2007**

OPENED: 8.07 pm

ATTENDANCES AND APOLOGIES: As per the Attendance book, 26 members were present and five apologies were received.

MINUTES TO THE MEETING: 16 May 2007. Moved: Kim Hanson Seconded: Ross Fix. that the Minutes for 16 May as printed in the Bulletin were a true record of the meeting. CARRIED

CORRESPONDENCE LIST AND TREASURER'S REPORT: were circulated with the Attendance Book having been dealt with by Committee, with Members to raise any matters as part of General Business.

FIELD TRIP REPORT:

- 1. The Field Trip Coordinator reported that the Corrigin/Babakin trip had a good turn up and many of the underground orchids were found. Also seen were Caladenia drummondii and Eriochilus.
- 2. The Mogumber trip for the 24 June is on, even if the weather is off. The FTC advised members to refer to their copy of the Bulletin for details of other trips this year.
- 3. President Christine advised that there would be a trip to Moora on 5 August. The Moora group was keen to make a day at the Candy Bush Track reserve to mark August as Biodiversity month. WANOSCG would participate and details would be settled at the next meeting. Matz Dahlkamp offered to take items for sale to the field day.
- 4. Noel Clarke reported the country north of Dalwallinu to be as dry as a bone, and could be forgotten for orchid hunting this year.
- 5. Bill Burton said that he and Sarah had again visited their Quindalup site, and found Pterostylis vittata had taken over. They had found

- one specimen in bud and 70cm high, beyond the general 15 45 cm
- 6. John Ewing together with Rob Hall had journeyed through Capel and the Ludlow Tuart Forest finding *Pterostylis vittata* and (?), Boranup Hill, and Charterhouse Road Augusta.
- Wayne Merritt (?) succeeded in finding a single Thelymitra apiculata in an extensive search of Mt Nasur NP.

PLANT TABLE:

- Bill Burton tabled several plants, one being *Diuris brumalis* or Winter Donkey Orchid.
- Also, Pterostylis sp. often called the Hairy Stemmed Snail Orchid
- 3. There were plants of *Pterostylis* vittata recovered from Quindalup, some showing mutations (dual labellums, split leaves).

GENERAL BUSINESS:

- Members were reminded that fees were due and payable - \$25 per family
- 2. John Ewing raised the possibility for members of WANOSCG to assist in monitoring some Declared Rare Flora (DRF) sites. The Committee had authorised John to approach Andrew Brown of the Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC) on the matter, and to be the Group liaison.
- 3. Tom Blinco alerted members to housing development north of Beechboro Road near Marshall Road which threatened sites of orchids (*Epiblema*). He had not had a response to calls to the North Region DEC, and thought the Local Authority for the area should have been aware of the reserves. He was referred to the Conservation Office of the Main Roads Western Australia for help.
- John Ewing, editor of the Bulletin, reported on his contact with Gloria Jackson in Walpole. He planned a

trip there on 8 July searching for *C. meridionalis* and anyone interested should contact him – see Bulletin for contact details.

GUEST PRESENTATIONS:

- Noel Clarke gave the members a very interesting and informative display of the variens complex among the Caladenias
- 2. Martin Revell, late President of the Friends of Kings Park and member of the Lotterywest project steering group, then spoke on the objectives, plans and achievements of the Avon Catchment Council.

RAFFLE DRAW: The raffle, donated by Stuart Harris, was drawn by the Guest Speaker, Martin Revell, and the winner after a thorough search of pockets was Ian Greeve.

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

Bill Burton and Sarah Atkinson visited a private property at Quindalup between june 2nd and the 8th. They found a few Eriochilis dilitatus subsp multiflorus, Leporella fimbriata and Prasophylum aff parvifolium still flowering, but no sign of Praecoxanthus aphylus after the good showing of these four species in early May.

Pterostylis vittata was plentiful, but in early flowering, Pt aff nana [Slender Snail] and Pt barbata were in bud and leaves of Caladenia flava subsp flava were evident. On June 7th we visited private property at Yallingup where we found a colony of about 20 Pt aff barbata that were also still in bud, but a number of them were very tall being up to 72cm high. Interestingly, Hoffman and Brown lists the upper height limit as 30cm, so it will be worth keeping an eye on these as they come to full flower.


MOGUMBER JUNE 24

It was a hopeful group that met at the Mogumber Tavern. We needed SUN and while it was there at 10am when we met, the clouds threateningly surrounded us. The fist move was to Gilingarra where we found Dark Banded Greenhood [Pterostylis sanguinea], although most plants were severely stunted. The lack of rain was in evidence. A handful of Moora Spider Orchid leaves [Caledenia exilis subsp vanleeuwenii]I were located, so perhaps with more rain they may be out for the club trip in August. There were also some Winter Donkey [Diuris brumalis] in bud. You can see how desperate we were ; having to resort to reporting on leaves and buds!

On to Mogumber Road West, and here we found the elusive Cleopatra's Needles [Thelymitra apiculata]. It was a substantial search, but 3 small groups of plants were found, only one of which was photographable. That, at least, was satisfaction. At a second site further west on the same road, two groups of snail orchids were the Broad-petalled and the Robust [Pt dilitata]. No further apiculatas were in evidence and finally the rain drove us back to the cars.

A final stop near Regans Ford proved equally limited. A handful of snails [Broadpetalled] and a small number of Pt sanguinea/aff sanguinea?? were located. It did seem that the lower sepals had some slight cupping on them suggesting they were either the Coastal Banded Greenhood or the Small Banded Greenhood. There were not enough vociferous arguers to create a robust debate, so it was all a rather lame conclusion.

After this, all departed for home. The next trip north was agreed to be on July 29th to find the Northern Queen of Sheba [T. aff variegate] (See details on back page.)



CLUB TRIP TO CORRIGIN - June 9th On a cold misty morning the four of us, namely, Matz, Eddy, Donna and myself, made our way to the rendezvous point at the corner of the Wickepin - Corrigin Rd, approx 12km west of Corrigin. We all waited there about quarter of an hour before moving off in convoy with some 13 other cars and drove to a reserve just west of Babakin on Bees Rd. There Mark Brundrett and Andrew Brown told how to find the Underground Orrchid (Rhizanthella gardneri). When we arrived it was still quite misty but by late morning it was nice and sunny. After much scratching around under the broom bushes (Melaleuca uncinata), both moving the leaf litter and then replacing it, several orchids were found including two lots of double ones found by your correspondent, one of which was dug away slightly so the stalk could be seen.




Late in the morning we all congregated back at the car park and decided to move further along Bees Rd to have lunch and view Caladenia drummondii, the Winter Spider Orchid, which were quite plentiful at

this spot.



After this we again moved about 100m down the road to look for more Underground Orchids. This time a clump of 7 orchids were found, several of which were reckoned to be juvenile orchids as their bracts were a pale colour and not the usual maroon.



When we had all had enough looking for these orchids we all made our various ways home again. Our party decided to follow the Fox group to Williams Rd just west of Brookton. After a tortuous slow "short cut" we arrived at the appointed site late in the afternoon. There we saw the Dark Banded Greenhood (Pterostylis sanguinea), two colour forms and the Banded Greebhood (P vittata). Also found were a very large number of Pterostylis hamiltonii (Red-veined Shell Orchid) in a variety of colours from very light to quite dark. There was even one that was a 'double header'.

New Orchid 'Discoveries' Orchids turn waspish In *The West Australian* newspaper of Wednesday 4th July 2007 a brief item under a headline the same as above stated that six new species of hammer orchids had been discovered in the the South-West of WA. The article went on to describe how these orchids have evolved to attract male wasps for the pollination process.

I found in 'NatureBase' a press statement dated Monday 02 July 2007 that had no doubt inspired the news item. The statement named the six species of *Drakaea* under reference, all of which are those shown in Hoffman and Brown 1998 Edition with Supplement with the exception of *Drakaea andrewsiae*, a likely subject for a field trip later this year.

The press release nominated a media contact, whom I contacted and he advised me that there had been an error in the presentation of the article. It should have been written around the fact that the species mentioned had been recently described, not discovered.

As far as I can see at this late stage for this Bulletin, the new descriptions have not yet been published.
