### FIELD TRIPS

Next Field Trip:Saturday 18th August. Day trip to Bindoon area, for early flowering orchids. Meet at the Bindoon Tavern at 10.00am.

Sunday 19th August. Australind for Corybas, Thelymitra variegata and maybe T. spiralis. Meet at 9.00am at the Australind Garage.

Sunday 19th to Sunday 26th August. KALBARRI TRIP. Trip leader is Bill Jackson,

Sunday 19th, meet at Regans Ford 10.00am sharp. Visit orchid sites enroute to Cockleshell Gully. Overnight bush camp at Cockleshell Gully.

Monday 20th, search Cockleshell Gully area, leave in time to reach McQueens Caravan Park (just north of the Arrowsmith River) by late afternoon. Overnight at McQueens.

Tuesday 21st, leave A.M. for Northampton, visiting orchid sites enroute. Overnight at Northampton Caravan Park.

Wednesday 22nd, leave A.M. for Kalbarri, visiting orchid sites enroute. Arrive midday, book into Caravan Park (probably Tudor), visit local orchid site.

Friday 24th, leave for Horrocks Beach Caravan Park in time to arrive by early afternoon, visit local orchid sites.


Saturday 25th, visit Point Gregory Reserve orchid site, and Nanson Road site enroute to Caravan Park at Dongarra for overnight stop.

Sunday 26th, head for home.

This trip is highly recommended to members. The leader did this trip in August 1988, and approximately 40 species of orchids should be sighted, including Caladenia crebra, C. wanosa and hybrids, plus the Kalbarri Drakea and Paracaleana, and the colourfull C. flava hybrids from this area.

Intending participants must register with the Group Field Trip Organiser (Ian Greeve).

### Mt. Jackson Trip - 1st; 2nd; 3rd September.



Take right fork through Lk Deborah, don't go to Mt. Jackson station. Visitors are not welcome.

September 1st; 2nd; 3rd. MT. JACKSON. Noel Clarke and Bill Jackson are meeting at Bullfinch on Thursday 30th August P.M. and will proceed to the Mt. Jackson area on Friday 31st August A.M., to set up camp and reconnoiter the area. Members who wish to make an early start are welcome to join them.

Members who cannot start early (workers not the idle rich) meet at Bullfinch on Saturday 1st September at 10.00am opposite the Hotel. The gravel road to Mt. Jackson is approximately 120kms from Bullfinch and last available fuel and supplies are at Southern Cross. We will be camping and intending trippers will have to provide their own facilities and supplies. The area is covered with mining leases so to prevent being ordered off - no metal detectors please.

### FIELD TRIP REPORTS

### Field Trip Report Thursday 7th June, 1990

At Regans Ford in the vicinity of the parking area, we found Leporella fimbriata and Pterostylis vittata in flower. On the Mogumber West Rd, were found Eriochilus dilatatus (leaves and seeds), Elythranthera brunonis leaves and Thelymitra apiculata, Pterostylis vittata and Pterostylis dilatatus in flower. We also found five Thelymitra apiculata on the south side of the road. At the Mogumber Reserve we found L. fimbriata in flower and Diuris sp., Pt. vittata and Pt. recurva leaves.

### Field Trip Report Sunday June 24th 1990 - Australind

Another beautiful, still sunny, winters day must have contributed to the good turnout. Ten cars in all assembled at the BP Service Station and after morning tea we proceeded to a nearby block adjoining the Eaton Kindergarten where we found Pterostylis robusta in abundance, also Pterostylis angusta and Pterostylis vittata were found growing amongst the rather dense weed.

It was very difficult to avoid stepping on the smaller Pterostylis angusta flowers as they were so well camouflaged.

Chris French led the group on to a stop along the Collie River where a few Pterostylis robusta and Pterostylis vittata were seen. We passed a burn site on Hands Avenue and investigated it on the way back. Very promising for the next trip down that way. The area was covered with leaves of Lyperanthus nigricans, and various Caladenia species including C. flava and C. latifolia. Flowering plants of Pterostylis angusta and Pterostylis vittata were found here as well, along with some Thelymitra leaves.

The next stop was to find a colony of Pterostylis rogersii along Spinnaker Road, heading back towards Perth. About 100 meters in from the road and well hidden in the undergrowth amongst lush Tuart/Peppermint forrest we found lovely Red/Brown specimens of Pterostylis rogersii. The photographers, after a bit of gardening, took some good shots.

Lunch at the cemetery. Out came the barbie. Most of us mere mortals who can only organise a sandwich were tortured by the delicious aroma of Ian's steak and sausage feast. Pt. robusta and Pt. vittata were found here along with Pt. recurva, Pt. pyramidalis, and Lyperanthus nigrican's leaves.

Two more stops were made before heading back. The rubbish tip along Binningup Road, and the 50km peg on the coast road. At the rubbish tip Pterostylis concava, Pterostylis vittata and Pterostylis pyramidalis colonies (all in bud) were found. The group also found some of the early form of Prasophyllum parvifolium which had already been fertilized as well as numerous Leporella fimbriata and leaves of a Diuris species, a Thelymitra species (possibly nuda) Elythranthera brunonis, Caladenia flava and C. reptans leaves.

At the 50km peg, Noel led us to a low lying area hoping to find Corybas dilatatus. It was too early for these orchids and not even the leaves were sighted, but we did see a number of Cyrtostylis reniformis leaves along the side of the firebreak. Many were in bud and just two flowering. Hard to find except for the telltale heart shaped leaf on the ground. When we returned to our cars a CALM ranger was there to see what we were doing in mass along the road side and at this point with tired children I left some of the members discussing the area with him.

It was a very pleasant and rewarding day I think all would agree.

- 2. Proposed Title.

  The name of "Propagation Material Bank" is proposed in order to cover all methods of propagation of W.A. Native Orchids. These methods include propagation from tubers, seed, plants and plant tissue.
- 3. Brief for Proposed "Propagation Material Bank".

The Sub-Committee will have the task of:-

- which are Establishing the objectives of a "Bank" compatible with the overall objectives of the group, constraints of the Wildlife within legal the other relevant 1950 and any Conservation Act legislation.
- b) Establishing administrative methods and procedures for the development and maintenance of the objectives suggested in 3a.
- c) Presenting its findings through the group management Committee for consideration with a view to adoption as policy by the WANOSCG general membership.
- 4. Proposed Objectives for the "Bank".
  - a) To facilitate a widespread and continuing interest in the preservation and propagation of W.A. indigenous orchids in natural, garden, nursery and laboratory habitats.
  - b) To develop, maintain and supervise ethical codes of conduct for the members of WANOSCG in the collection and harvesting of propagation source material and for its use, transfer or disposal.
  - c) To facilitate the development and documentation of experience in the collection of propagation material.

- d) To facilitate the development and documentation of experience in the propagation of W.A. indigenous orchids.
- e) To acquire, expand and nurture a collection of orchid propagation material to further the objective outlined in 4a and to prevent the extinction of threatened or scarce species (within the constraints of any relevant legislation or WANOSCG policy).

The major differences between the Pterostylis dilatata and Pterostylis nana are basal leaves and flowering colour, size and time.

The major differences between the Pterostylis nana and Pterostylis pyramidalis are basal leaves, stem length and leaves, galea and flowering colour, size, time and habitat.,

Data for this comparison was gleaned from David Jones's book "Native Orchids of Australia".
