1. PREVIOUS GENERAL MEETING MINUTES

Amendments to the minutes of the 15 June 2016 General Meeting that appeared in the July bulletin:

Second sentence of item 7.3 should read "It is understood that works have commenced without a Clearing Permit – we can mount protests individually but not act formally against the authority as a group."

Subject to the amendment mentioned, it was moved by Tom Burbidge and seconded by Ross Fox that the General Meeting Minutes of 20 June 2016, as published in the July 2016 bulletin, are a true and accurate record of that meeting. *Carried.*

2. BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE PREVIOUS MEETING

2.1 Supper Roster for 2016: Still require members to help with the Supper roster for August - November. The list was tabled and members asked to sign up. It was noted that members can be reimbursed for the cost, if necessary.

2.2 Website of validated digital photos of all WA native orchids: The image site is progressing well. (Gail Reed had sent through many images recently.)

- It was noted that only general location information should be included with each image, not detailed coordinates.
- Concern was expressed regarding the new image heading the home page, that some members might object to their personal photographs being published on a publicly accessible website. Noel Hoffman will email the photograph to Jay Steer who will send the question out to the members concerned. The committee will consider the issue at its next meeting.

2.3 Upgrade of the current WANOSCG Website:

- Nothing further has happened yet.
- It was acknowledged that it should be fairly simple to move the static part of the current website to the image site.

2.4 Snail Trip book: Ramon has asked Jay Steer to hand out books once people have paid the treasurer.

2.5 Study groups:

- Activity in the *Caladenia drummondii* group has quietened down, although some finished leaves and flowers had been noted in a reserve near Corrigin.
- The snail group has noted a new population of *Pterostylis timothyi* near Kojonup extending the range for that species. Andrew Brown has challenged the group to do a comparative study between *P timothyi* and *P parva*.

2.6 WANOSCG conducting surveys for local governments: Update from Jon Warren.

Jon has had meetings with eight local governments that agreed to cooperate resulting in the nomination of 14 areas. A few of the nominated areas had not yet been taken up for survey and, in this regard, interested members were invited to contact Jon after the meeting.

In addition there are matters regarding locking the main door once the meeting is underway and individuals holding keys, issues that Jay Steer will clarify further.

6. FIELD TRIPS

6.1 The following group field trips were organised during the month since the last meeting:

- 26 June Field trip to Cataby/Badgingarra areas identified several specimens of *Thelymitra apiculata*, early donkey orchids, snails and greenhoods.
- 17 July Noble Rd, NE of Arthur River
This was a very varied habitat with flowering specimens identified of *Caladenia hiemalis*, *C reptans*, *C longiclavata*, two species of *Diuris*, two snail species, hare leaves and a flower past, plus seven other species. This location is believed to have potential for more orchids later in the season.

6.2 Upcoming Field trips

- 24 July - Bullsbrook and Jurien areas (*Thelymitra pulcherrima*) – this group will be split into two with half starting in Jurien (led by Margaret Petridis(MP)) and the other half starting in Cataby (led by Kevin Uhe). Participants were asked to let MP know which group they wished to join.
- 20-21 August - Geraldton
- 17-18 September - Kojonup
- 24-26 September - Albany and Stirling Range
- There will possibly also be a trip to the burn near Yarloop in September and Kevin Uhe is organising another trip east of Kalgoorlie for “rufa” snails (camping with strictly limited numbers of cars), likely to start on 2 October.

6.3 Personal Field Trips:

Members are requested to fill out the personal field trip report form on the front table to make the Secretary’s job easier and send electronic Orchid Sighting sheets to the Registrar (Ramon Newmann wanoscg.registrar@gmail.com or [REDACTED] If you don’t have a copy of the report or sighting sheet then send an email to the Secretary (Pat Richards – [REDACTED]) and she will provide you with an electronic copy.

- Members reported having seen many species in leaf or in bud, including *Pyrorchis nigricans* and *Thelymitra benthamiana* and *T crinita*, various *Caladenia* leaves, *Diuris* and rabbit orchids.
- Flowering specimens of *Cyrtostylis huegelii*, *Pterostylis aspera*, *Caladenia longiclavata*, *C hiemalis*, other spiders, *Thelymitra pulcherrima*, *Diuris* species and many *P vittata* and *P sanguinea* were also reported.

7. CONSERVATION

7.1 Tim Hodgkins (TH) tabled his reports and supplemental information, in summary:

- WANOSCG has been welcomed as new members of the Urban Bushland Council.
- Clearing notices lodged by local authorities are being monitored and further details of a roadside slashing incident in the Great Southern are being sought.
- Members with updated information on projects - Norwest Energy, Eneabba; BAJV Bauxite, Morangup/Avon Valley NP; Meelup Regional Reserve Mountain Bike Trail; and Warwick Bushland Hockey Stadium – are asked to contact TH as soon as possible.
- A leader is being sought to lead a field survey in mid to late August of this year of the area that would be affected by the proposed Bunbury Outer Ring Road, where there may be a population of *Thelymitra variegata* amongst other species that could be threatened. Interested members should contact TH. Comments are invited regarding the suggestion that a local group such as CLG, that also has permission to survey and relocate orchids under the supervision of MRD, should be supported by us.
- Written or verbal reports on most significant reserves have been submitted in the last two years, the most recent relating to the Hollywood Reserve, Nedlands.

7.2 Eddy Wajon (EW) expanded on his previous report regarding the clearing of road verges on the Boxhill to Ongerup Road.

- He believes the amount of clearing is excessive and unnecessary and the nature of the treatment of the areas once cleared inappropriate. He also believes that any flora survey that was performed was completely superficial, at the wrong time of year and with inadequate time ahead of the works for meaningful appraisal.
- EW indicated that he personally proposes to forward a fully reasoned 4-page protest to the Department of

Environment, and will forward a copy to TH for his information. In addition, EW also suggested that individual members might wish to protest with a shorter message. In this regard, it was agreed that, with EW's input, TH would draft two shorter submissions, one for forwarding by WANOSCG in support of EW's submission, and the other a brief submission for use by members who wished to lend their voices to the protest on an individual basis. TH undertook to copy his two drafts to Jay Steer for his review.

It was moved by Tim Hodgkins and seconded by Jeanette Wheatley that the conservation report as circulated in the meeting be accepted. *Carried.*

8. GROWER'S TABLE

Nothing tabled.

9. GENERAL BUSINESS

9.1 *New rules for associations and incorporated clubs:* Consideration of the implications of the new rules and the Group's adaptation response is ongoing.

9.2 *Tim Hodgkins indicated that he had begun receiving The Orchid Review magazine* noting that further renaming of orchids is happening and that the different states are not necessarily using the same name for a particular species. In some cases the names used have not been ratified. It is understood that the Royal Horticultural Society in London is reviewing the situation on an international basis.

Michael Macpherson presented on techniques designed to optimise native orchid photography.

Conservation Officer Report to 2016 August General meeting

Clearing Notices:

I am continuing to view the clearing notices weekly, but have not seen any this month that involve rare or threatened orchid species. Concerns about illegal clearing in the Great Southern are discussed below .

Projects under watch:

- Norwest Energy, Eneabba
- BAJV Bauxite, Morangup/Avon Valley NP
- Meelup Regional Reserve – Mountain Bike Trail
- Warwick Bushland - Hockey Stadium construction now half completed
- Bunbury Outer ring road – awaits funding.

Members with updated information on these projects should contact me ASAP .

Roadside clearing

Eddy Wajon has brought this issue to our attention after what appeared to be illegal clearing occurred in the Great Southern in the Shire of Jerramungup. Subsequently a Clearing Notice has been filed for this project on the Boxwood hill- Ongerup Road. It was open for comment until August 14th 2016.

We have agreed to support the efforts of Eddy by writing to the Shire about the matter and providing members with a draft letter that can be used to comment on the Clearing Notice. This letter has been sent on behalf of the Group to the DER.

Helena & Aurora Range

The issue of potential mining in this area has been around for some time. It would alarm most Western Australians to know our Environment Minister has gone against the independent advice of the Environment Protection Agency (EPA). But unfortunately it appears Minister Jacob has done precisely this.

The Helena and Aurora Range is a pristine landscape; the “jewel in the crown” of our Great Western Woodlands. It is a spectacular banded-ironstone formation, a biodiversity hotspot, home to more than 75 bird species, to say nothing of many species of orchids and one of our State treasures.

As with the Roadside Clearing issue we will be preparing letters on behalf of our Group to go to the Minister and for members to use to send their local WA member.

Reserves

Thanks to all who have reported on reserves in which we have a special interest. This need will be ongoing and I anticipate that in 2017/18 we will want to review all seven (7) reserves again.

New Reserve to be named for our 40th

It may be time to re-visit this possibility so I will bring it back onto my agenda for discussion and consideration.

CATABY – JURIEN FIELD TRIP JULY 24

The field trip was split into two groups to cope with large numbers and to cater for those members who were able to travel up to the Jurien area the night before, and also for those doing a day trip starting in Cataby.

The northern group started at Jurien with Margaret Petridis and the southern group at Cataby under Kevin Uhe. It was planned to meet half way at lunchtime to discover what each group had found so the groups could cross over.

Cataby Group

An enthusiastic group met at the Cataby Roadhouse in bright sunlight, albeit with a rather chilly breeze, and then proceeded up the Brand Highway to an area where the *Thelymitra pulcherrima* had been seen in 2009. The group spread out and found a number of hare orchid leaves, cowslip leaves and flowering small banded greenhoods. Suddenly an excited shout over the two way from Pat Richards had the group heading in her direction but it was soon determined that the flower was in



fact *T apiculata* (Cleopatra’s Needles).

As no plants of the target species had been located the group moved further up the highway to a location where there was a burnt area and a spot where the target orchid has been seen the day before by an eagle eyed Jeanette from a moving vehicle!!! The burnt area produced one small specimen of the target orchid in very tight bud. An exciting find was one lone specimen of a blue china (*Cyanicula*). Of interest is that although this has been placed into *Cyanicula gemmata* it is thought to be different with further studies to determine its exact status. Also seen were numerous leaves and buds of cowslip orchids (*Caladenia flava*) and both the small banded and northern greenhood.

At the top a small ridge the group were disappointed to see the first Queens in bud but Dave Lawson managed to find some beautiful specimens of the target orchid in full flower further down the area. Despite searching a wide area it appeared that the Queens were confined to a very small area. Also located in the same area were a number of Autumn leeks (*Prasophyllum parvifolium*) in various stages of flowering, the Robust snail (*Pterostylis dilatata*) and small banded greenhood (*Pterostylis* sp. ‘small bands’).

Contact with the Jurien group revealed that they had not found the target orchid so they then arranged to come down to our location instead of the two groups meeting in the middle. A keen eyed orchid hunter located one lone specimen of the blue fairy (*Pheladenia deformis*), as usual very close to the cars!!

One last stop was made at a spot Bob Steer wanted a group to survey given the large area involved. The group managed to locate a number of Cleopatra’s Needles finishing off as well as some Northern Queens in tight bud. A number of greenhoods were also seen, together with some robust snails and one blue fairy.

Jurien Group

We had information from Jurien locals that the northern queen (*Thelymitra pulcherrima*) was flowering on private property east of the town but we were unable to take the group to see them there on the day. We searched several areas of similar and suitable habitat nearby, but failed to find any plants of the elusive queen.

We did find the Fringed leek (*Prasophyllum fimbria*), the Arrowsmith spider (*Caladenia crebra*) and banded greenhoods (*Pterostylis* sp. 'small bands') in flower and leaves of several other species.

As we headed to the agreed meeting place at lunch time, we had a phone call from the Cataby group to say they had found some plants in flower near Badgingarra. They urged us to hurry over, so we delayed lunch until we met the other group on the Brand Highway.

We enjoyed seeing the early flowering northern Queen of Sheba plants and an early blue china in flower that the other group had located.

We named Cayda. Margaret Petridis found her broken out of the ground by a kangaroo and rescued her. We carried her in the car for 2 days and she dutifully came out every day once it got warm and sunny...and closed at night. The photo below shows detail I had never noticed before. She was from the Badgingarra area.

BEYOND JURIEEN



Following the WANOSCG field trip to Cataby and Jurien, Lyn and I headed north to Geraldton to stay with Beth Teale and go looking in local reserves for a couple of days.

On Monday we found the Kalbarri shell flowering near the coast and then visited a reserve near Eneabba where we saw blue fairies, donkeys, snails, shells, banded greenhoods and jugs in flower, on the way up, and arrived in Geraldton around 5pm.

On the Tuesday we headed north to the Yuna area and found lots of snails and blue fairies in flower, and spiders in bud near Nanson with the lucky find of a few spiders out...both *Caladenia footeana* and *Caladenia pluvialis* (Yuna spider). In a reserve near Yuna we found blue fairies, including white ones, the Dwarf Zebra (*Caladenia pachychila*) and pink fairies (*Caladenia reptans*). We also found a good population of *Caladenia drummondii*...finished flowers and leaves that will warrant an earlier visit next year.

We visited a large burnt area on the Geraldton Mt Magnet road near Wicherina and found Red Beaks (*Pyrorchis nigricans*), *Caladenia* sps. and Leek orchids (*Prasophyllum*) in bud.

On the Wednesday we visited more reserves north of Geraldton and found a variety of donkey orchids, the Kalbarri cowslip (*Caladenia flava* subsp. *maculata*), greenhoods and snails (*Pterostylis platypetala*) in flower. We also found a nice group of the Noble spider (*Caladenia nobilis*) in flower.

On Thursday we headed south to Eneabba, finding similar species on the way. We drove along a track west of Eneabba and found hundreds of blue fairies, including 2 plants with double flowers. Some plants were very tall...250 – 300mm! We also found a confusing array of small red spiders, both *Caladenia footeana* and *C. occidentalis*, with possible intermediate forms.


On our way back to Perth last Friday we stopped in a burn near Eneabba and were delighted to find a large population of an early flowering, undescribed *Cyanicula*...blue china. That topped off an amazing week very nicely.

NOTHING OF THE BEE REMAINS, BUT WE KNOW IT EXISTED FROM THE SHAPE OF THE FLOWER.





And the answer is.... In the July bulletin Andrew Brown penned an article about how difficult it is to identify species from photographs. He challenged members to identify a *Diuris* species from a close-up photo published with the article. Well, it was *Diuris hazeliae* (Yellow Granite donkey). Did you get that right?

DIEBACK PREVENTION

Dieback (*Phytophthora cinnamomi*) is one of the key threatening processes to Australian biodiversity. Whilst it is not known to attack native orchids directly, it results in loss of orchid habitat and potential loss of species.

Dieback lives in soil, water and plant material. It is very well adapted to Australian conditions as it produces different spores: a short-lived variety that favours moist conditions and a long-lived dormant spores that can survive in dry conditions and even after fire!

Human activity is primarily responsible for a spread of dieback —road building, mining, off-road driving, bushwalking and gardening.

In our passion to look for and photograph orchids, we need to make sure that we do not contribute to the spread of dieback.

Please follow dieback prevention hygiene (start clean and stay clean). Where possible, stick to tracks, avoid wet soil conditions. Use cleaning stations or you own brush to remove soil from your boots and other items. Use 70% metho to spray your boots after leaving each location and entering a new one.

ATTENTION MEMBERS
