FIELD TRIPS

FIELD TRIP REPORTS

Muirs Highway Area



A small group of members in five cars met in Manjimup on Saturday, 20 October and headed east along the Muirs Highway. Our intention was to check out some burnt areas along and south of the highway over the weekend.

We stopped in several locations in the morning and found a few different orchid species in flower at each:

- In burnt forest we found bearded bird (Pterostylis turfosa), stumpy spider (Caladenia ensata), leaping spider (C macrostylis), rabbit orchid (Leptoceras menziesii) and purple enamel (Elythranthera brunonis).
- In a low wet area we found the laughing leek (Prasophyllum macrostachyum), swamp mignonette (Microtis atrata), pink fan (Caladenia nana subsp unita), and blue china (Cyanicula gemmata) on a gravel rise above it.
- In white sand on a flat we found king-in-his-carriage (Drakaea glyptodon), narrow-lipped hammer (Drakaea thynniphila), flying duck (Paracaleana niarita) and cowslip orchid (Caladenia flava subsp flava).

We met up with the rest of the group either en route along the highway or at the second meeting point west of Thompson Road. In this area we explored unburnt bush on the north side of the highway and burnt areas on the south (burnt Nov-Dec 2017), and added king spider (Caladenia pectinata), rusty spider (C ferruginea), Muirs Highway bird (Pterostylis longicomis), king leek (Prasophyllum regium), swamp leek (P drummondii) (in bud) and others to our list.

After lunch we headed south down Thompson Road and stopped in three locations. At the first we saw crab-lipped spider (Caladenia plicata), white fairy (C marginata), forest mantis (C attingens subsp attingens), purple pansy (Diuris longifolia) and a few others. At the next two stops the orchids were disappointingly scarce, probably due to the low intensity and wrong timing of the burn, we think.




Our last stop for the day was in another recent (Dec 2017) burn east of Lake Muir where we found some lovely dainty leeks (*Prasophyllum plumiforme*), bee orchids (*Diuris laxiflora*), the Caldyanup snail orchid (*Pterostylis* sp 'robust'), dark mignonette (*Microtis orbicularis*) and ray spider (*Caladenia radiata*) in flower.

On Sunday, 21 October, we met at the eastern end of Blue Lake Road, south-west of Mt Barker, finding rattle beaks (Lyperanthus serratus), warty hammers (Drakaea livida) and flying ducks (Paracaleana nigrita) nearby before following Krystyna to locations in a prescribed burn west and south of there.

At one location we saw and surveyed a population of the rare Threatened species *Drakaea micrantha*, the dwarf hammer, which had been previously found by Krystyna and Maggie. A TPFR form has subsequently been completed and sent in to DBCA for this population. We also saw some leaves and buds of *Pyrorchis forrestii*, pink beaks, that were just showing colour.

At other locations we found the little pink fan (Caladenia nana subsp nana), karri spider (C brownii), karri cowslip (C flava subsp sylvestris) and leaping spider (C macrostylis).



After lunch at Blue Lake, several members left the convoy to head home. The rest of us proceeded north to another prescribed burn north of Bevan Road, east of Nornalup Road. On the way we headed up a short cut and came across an unexpectedly steep river crossing, which stopped the convoy for consultation on the safety of the crossing for all of the vehicles. While we were stopped, several flowering plants of the beautiful butterfly orchid, (Caladenia lobata) were seen.

Once all vehicles were safely across the river, (even my smaller AWD vehicle!) we explored some nearby granites and found a population of over 20 *Caladenia lobata* plants.

Proceeding west, we crossed the Kent River and stopped to explore a low wet area in the burn. There we found nanny goats (*Diuris laevis*), hooded leeks (*Prasophyllum cucullatum*) and pink fans (*Caladenia nana subsp unita*). Later we came across a granite rock and found finished plants of flying ducks (*Paracaleana nigrita*) in moss on the rock as well as buds of the swamp beard (*Calochilus uliginosa*) nearby.

All in all, it was a productive trip in terms of different orchids seen (46 species in flower) but numbers were low, possibly due to the low intensity and timing of the prescribed burn.

Thank you to all members who attended and helped to make it an enjoyable weekend.

Southern Rivers Group

September was busy with many SRG branch ADORP surveys, a number of small group ADORP surveys and one field trip. It was time to slow down into the rhythm of just enjoying the bush and orchids without all the counting.

North of Denmark and closer to home, we followed up on last year's attempt to gain access to a burn when we were halted by creeks and bogs. Today we swapped around cars to get where we needed to. First stop "The Swamp". Before even stepping out of the car the purple enamel orchid (*Elythranthera brunonis*) and the nanny goat (*Diuris laevis*) were sighted. These were followed by large numbers of Karri spider orchids (*Caladenia brownii*) ranging in heights and shades of greens and reds. Spreading out over the whole swamp were yawning leeks (*Prasophyllum hians*), swamp mignonettes (*Microtis atrata*), southern fringed leeks (*Prasophyllum sp* 'southern'), white fairies (*Caladenia marginata*), and cowslip orchids (*Caladenia flava*) were sighted. Moving onto the outer margins and into the bush, we found blue ladies (*Thelymitra crinita*), shy suns (*T graminea*) and bearded birds (*Pterostylis turfosa*) as well as very immature tall leek plants (*Prasophyllum elatum* complex) in very tight bud. Much time was spent trying to identify a group of quite different karri spider orchids (*Caladenia brownii*). Eventually with the help of the book we settled on karri x ray spider hybrid (*Caladenia brownii* x *C radiata*). Many more orchid buds across the swamp were seen, thus a return visit in the near future is on the agenda.

Our second focus was into an area used (legally) by locals to collect fire wood. Just perfect! There were dozens of small tracks to follow in the two year old burn. First stop was at a cross road with a range of soils and vegetation. Here we sighted many purple pansy orchids (*Diuris longifolia*) and some rattle beaks (*Lyperanthus serratus*). In the opposite direction in white sand were king-in-his-carriage (*Drakaea glyptodon*) as well as flying ducks (*Paracaleana nigrita*). The latter had a very high rate of pollination.















Stop two was a real treat with scented mignonettes (*Microtis alboviridis*) and stumpy spiders (*Caladenia ensata*) added to the list. Orchids were growing right up to the roadside edges of the tracks making the slow driving conditions very pleasant.

Our final stop was in a swamp beside the highway. Sun orchids galore! Tiger sun (*Thelymitra tigrina*) was still in tight bud, however, blue lady (*T crinita*) was in full bloom in the warm afternoon sun. Here we added common mignonettes (*Microtis media* subsp *media*) and (South African) brown finger orchids (*Disa bracteata*) to the long list of orchids found on the day.

I wish to thank Jeff and Wendy for their excellent recce work as well as being the accomplished leaders of today's wanderings through their local bush.



ADOPT AN ORCHID PROJECT (ADORP)

Welcome to Mick Hurdus and Lisa Wilson from Albany who have recently joined the ADORP program and they join the SRG team looking after their respective priority orchids.

The total hours completed in the first quarter (July to September) was 1,967 which is an impressive commitment by all concerned. Putting that into perspective last year's total hours recorded were 2,446 so well on track to record a considerable increase this year.

A number of surveys have now been completed and initial results are very encouraging with new populations being found and good counts for many target taxa.

Once the final reports have been forwarded for this year's surveys consideration will be made to which taxa could be the focus of an application to apply for Threatened status or upgrading or downgrading of priority status.



MEMBERSHIP CORNER

So far in the year 2018 we have 160 memberships covering 240 people including 14 new members compared to 2017 where we had 154 memberships covering 230 people including 16 new members. Since 2015 the group's membership has steadily risen from 199 members to the current 240 members.

WANOSCG Grant Project Update

Protective Cages for Glossy-leafed Hammer Orchid

Ron Fauntleroy has been busy doing more work in the field with the glossy-leafed hammer orchid (*Drakaea elastica*) and writing up the survey results following his experimental deployment of cages to protect against predation by feral animals. The survey results, some of which are very interesting so far, cover 10 different areas and Ron will report on those results and provide some copies at the general meeting in Perth on 21 November.

Preparation for 2019 under the New Constitution

The 2018 orchid year is now rapidly winding down with the start of the hot dry summer months in the south-western part of WA, however recent legislation has mandated a new WANOSCG constitution that will govern the group from 1 February 2019. This will require more formal preparation for the next orchid year ahead of the group's Annual General Meeting on 20 March.

In September a special resolution was passed to update our constitution as from 2019 to comply with the legislation. We have since been advised that further amendments need to be carried out to ensure full compliance. Consequently, a notice of special resolution under the terms of our current constitution is being forwarded to members. The intention is for the special resolution to be put to the vote at the general meeting on 21 November 2018.

In addition, preparation for the new constitution involves making a formal invitation to all ordinary members to nominate to stand for election as committee members and/or subsidiary office positions. Election of the committee will take place at the March AGM followed by election of the subsidiary office holders.

Members receiving this issue of the Bulletin will also receive the notice of special resolution together with forms enabling them to nominate for the respective committee and/or subsidiary positions. To assist members who may be considering volunteering to fill a position, a set of role descriptions is also being included. Note that all nominations for **committee** membership must be endorsed and signed by a nomination supporter (who is also an ordinary member).

Forms completed and signed may be scanned and forwarded by email, mailed hard copy to the group's PO box or handed directly to the secretary, John Ewing. Note that, regardless of means of transmission, nomination forms for committee positions are to be received by the secretary no later than 20 February 2019. Committee nomination forms received after that date will not be considered valid.

The ongoing continuity of the group is greatly facilitated by a reserve of knowledgeable and enthusiastic members who are willing to step up to serve in the various committee and subsidiary positions. A spell serving as an ordinary committee member is not onerous and is a great way to learn how the group is organised, plus it serves as very useful experience for those who may be time poor currently but might be willing to serve as a designated officer at a later date.

2018 WANOSCG Photo Competition – General Meeting, 21 November

Final reminder of the rules for entry of photos:

- 1 Subject of photo to be any subspecies of cowslip orchid (Caladenia flava) but NOT a hybrid
- 2 Prints to be any size up to A4 (210 mm x 297 mm), but no larger
- 3 Prints to be neither mounted nor framed and should have the entrant's name on the back.

Members wishing to submit an entry but who are unable to attend the November meeting in person should write their name on the back of the photo and put it into an envelope marked "Photo Competition" to ensure that it is opened only by the impartial competition scrutineer. They should then forward the entry by mail to WANOSCG at PO Box 323, Victoria Park WA 6979 to arrive no later than Friday, 16 November.

Illegal Removal of Native Orchids – Reminder

It is illegal to remove native flora from public lands without an appropriate licence and, in the case of threatened flora, it is illegal to remove it from any lands, including private land without ministerial approval. The Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016 now provides for substantial deterrent penalties, up to \$500,000 for a person taking threatened flora species.

Some of our members have noted clear signs of native orchids having been dug up and removed, possibly illegally. Members have also seen evidence of damage to populations of native orchids listed as threatened, including vegetation clearing, spraying of herbicide and removal of plants. We encourage members seeing such evidence to report it without delay to the appropriate DBCA District Office.
