It has been the habit over a number of years to have a special Xmas get together sometimes at a restaurant sometimes on a field trip. Your committee has decided on a field trip this year to the Denmark area on 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> December.

#### **MOORA BUSH**

The Shire of Moora is moving in the right direction to have the bush area on the edge of town where *C vanleeuwenii* grows vested in the Shire with the area eventually fenced. Good news, we started this project about 6 years ago.

#### LOTTERY WEST GRANT

Part of the Lotteries West grant that we applied for 2 years ago to cover study of our bush orchids has finally been approved. Because of the large sum of money involved it has been split into 2 lots.

## SEPTEMBER TALK by DAVE DOBAK

It was good to meet up with our American members Jan & Dave Dobak but it's a long way to come to pay their subs.

Dave's entertaining talk was on the orchids, other plant life & their habitats in an area of Southeastern Italy & Switzerland. How the orchids survive is astonishing because they often grow in open fields where cattle graze while the plants are above ground. The quality of the slides was excellent. The stems of the orchids looked fairly thick so wind would be no problem.

## FIELD TRIP REPORT – MANJIMUP, 30 SEPTEMBER – 2 OCTOBER 2006 by TOM BLINCO

There was overnight and early rain for those already there, and early morning rain for those travelling on the day, but Saturday morning was sunny with some cloud as 20 participants gathered at Bridgetown at 10 am for the Manjimup field trip.

We welcomed visitors from Tasmania Roger and Betty Hay (members of ANOS Victoria), and four recent members attending their first field trip – Trevor and Jean Cunningham from Albany, Maxine Has and Etienne Delannoy from the Metro area.

Two late withdrawals resulted in a little delay at the start, before the convoy of ten cars proceeded along the Bridgetown - Nannup Road, still one of the most scenic drives in WA.

Three sites of past bushfires (times uncertain) were inspected, the first being the most productive. Here were found Cyanicula sericea, (Silky Blue Orchid), Caladenia macrostylis (Leaping Spider), C. nana subsp nana (Little Pink Fan), C. nana subsp unita (Pink Fan), C. flava subsp sylvestris (Karri Cowslip) and a nice C nana x flava hybrid, and Pt. aff nana (Slender Snail Orchid). A quick stop at the second fire site was unproductive, whilst at the third site, only Cyrtostylis huegelii (Midge Orchid) was added to the list.

We then turned back to look along Nannup Scenic Drive, and near the corner of Sears Road, most of the above were again seen. This area was quite picturesque with karri trees and wattle.

Next stop was Eastbourne Road (Diamond Tree), where there were, amongst other things and not in a burnt area, numerous Prasophyllum regium (King Leek) that were quite pale in colour, and a black-stemmed P fimbria (was it?) (Fringed Leek). Whilst here there was the loud noise of approaching traffic on the highway that turned out to be a touring motor cycle group comprising about 65 very noisy machines.

Next stop was a burn at a bush track off Muirs Highway, not far from Manjimup. Here were *Pyrorchis nigricans* (Red Beaks), *Cy. sericea*, *C. flava* subsp sylvestris, C. nana subsp nana, a Diuris species not familiar to anyone present but could be mistaken for D. magnifica or a small D. amplissima, a small P. fimbria (?), and a very pretty C. flava x nana hybrid. Along the way some attention had been paid to a certain football match in Melbourne, and the final siren sounded whilst we were here.

Peter then took us to another track off Muirs Highway to attempt to identify a Cyrtostylis (possibly tenuissima), but it had finished. A Pterostylis aff barbata (Bloated Bird Orchid) was seen here.

After arrival back at Kin Kin, Wayne and Etienne went looking in the nearby bush, finding *C. reptans* subsp. *reptans* (Little Pink Fairy), *C. flava* subsp *sylvestris*, *C. macrostylis*, and *Cy. sericea*.

On Sunday, with two members using the Manjimup Caravan Park and the de Haan family staying at their farm not far from Manjimup, we met on Muirs Highway at the corner of Wheatley Coast Road. Four neighbours joined us here for part of the day.

We proceeded along Muirs Highway to Frosty Road, where there was a great display, including Paracaleana nigrita (Flying Duck Orchid), P. disjuncta (Little Duck Orchid – previously P. linearifolia), Drakaea livida (King-in-his-Carriage), D. glyptodon (Warty Hammer Orchid), and hybrids between these two and some unidentifiable other hybrids or variations, C. plicata (Crab-lipped Spider Orchid), C. caimsiana (Zebra Orchid), C. macrostylis, C. nana subsp nana, Py. nigricans, and Elythranthera brunonis (Purple Enamel Orchid).

A brief stop was made on Tonebup Road, but this area was very dry and nothing was found in flower.

The next stop was on Muirs Highway before Thomson Road, where there were

T. antennifera (Lemon-scented Sun Orchid), T. flexuosa (Twisted Sun Orchid), and C. pectinata (King Spider Orchid).

At Thomson Road were *D. longifolia* (Purple Pansy Orchid), *Pt. barbata* (Bird Orchid), *C. christineae* (Christine's Spider Orchid), *C. flava* subsp *flava* (Cowslip), *C. ensata* (Stumpy Spider Orchid), *C. pectinata*, *C. macrostylis and Cy. sericea*.

Further along Muirs Highway were Microtis orbicularis (Dark Mignonette Orchid), Pt. aff nana (Snail Orchid type, broadish labellum, unidentified), C. flava subsp flava, C. barbarossa (Common Dragon Orchid), C. harringtoniae (Pink Spider Orchid) and C. latifolia (Pink Fairy) and possible hybrids between these two.

Next we stopped at a burn adjacent to Red Lake, but only *Cy. sericea* was seen here.

Next stop was on Southfield Road, where there was *T. crinita* (Blue Lady), *C. discoidea* (Bee Orchid), *C. longicauda* subsp *eminens* (Stark White Spider Orchid), *E. brunonis*, and probably the most exciting find of the field trip, a lone

C. erythrochila (Lake Muir Blood Orchid). This little, inconspicuous orchid was discovered by Ross Fox, after being requested to look at a white spider orchid flowering quite closely nearby.

Further on, near a creek line, there was a Caladenia not positively identified that looked like C. evanescens but was probably a pale looking C. luteola. (I was not there but it is definitely not C evanescens. I saw this orchid in the days when C luteola was known as C caesarea ssp subdita and there was some doubts about it then. I have not heard of any new name for it. Noel Clarke.).

At Tonebridge Campsite it was very dry, but *C. cairnsiana*, *flava* subsp *flava*, *C. vulgata* (Common Spider), *T. flexuosa and T. antennifera* were found. Nearby, at the Tonebridge settlement, were *C. barbarossa*, *flava* subsp flava, *longicauda* 

subsp eminens, vulgata, and (after much discussion) C. rhomboidiformis (Diamond Spider Orchid).

On Monday the party met in Manjimup, allowing for any refuelling as necessary, then proceeded along South West Highway to Seaton Ross Road, then to a swamp area that was found to be not nearly as swampy as it has been in better seasons. Even so, found here were *T flexuosa*, *Pt* aff *nana* (? two species of Snail Orchid), *C. christineae*, *C. uliginosa* subsp *patulens* (Frail Spider Orchid), and *M. orbicularis*.

From here to a track off Hester Road, where there were *T. macrophylla* (Scented Sun Orchid), *Pt.* aff *turfosa* (Boyup Bird Orchid), *D longifolia*, *D. corymbosa* (Common Donkey Orchid), and a lone *C. nana* subsp *nana* (or *unita?*).

The final site was at Press Road off South West Highway; seen were *D. longifolia*, *C. macrostylis*, *C. flava* subsp *flava*, *C. discoidea*, and an unnamed little white *Caladenia*.

After here only three cars were left to return to Perth, and we paused for lunch near Balingup at a favourite spot of the writer where we have stopped many times over the years. Here were *D. longifolia*, *C. macrostylis*, *longiclavata*, *flava* subsp *flava*, *longicauda* subsp *eminens*, (with all five flowering in one small area the size of a dining table), *D. corymbosa and C. attingens* subsp. *attingens* (Forest Mantis Orchid).

## Kin Kin Retreat

As the base for this field trip was a departure from the usual caravan parks, park cabins, motels or camping, a word about Kin Kin Retreat may be appropriate.

In each room there was an information sheet for guests, and the first sentence reads - "Thank you for choosing to stay at Kin Kin, we hope your stay outshines your expectations".

Well, for us the expectations were certainly exceeded. The accommodation was excellent, with a good-sized room. good hot showers, Queen Size double bed, and electric blankets if required. The all-timber walls and ceiling of the cabins are very pleasant. The central "Lodge" is a large building containing administration, cooking facilities, dining area, and relaxation space with open log fire. The Managers (since January) are Sandi and Pete Cooke, and in the past six months they have spent a large amount of money refurbishing floor coverings, window treatments, equipment and guest facilities. and the upgrading work is not yet complete. The Continental breakfast bar was more than ample, supplemented on Sunday morning by delicious hot chocolate muffins. On Saturday and Monday mornings, there was Sandi's home made hot bread.

Many birdcalls and twitterings are heard from an early hour, and Pete has identified 52 species of birds so far. A pair of Blue Wrens, frequenting the shrubbery around the Lodge and I understand will feed by hand, were brilliant. We may just visit there again.

Despite early reservations about the effect of the dry season, this was a very good field trip. Many thanks go to Field Trip Coordinator Ross (and Margaret), and those whom attended.

In conclusion, this report has been prepared in some haste to meet the (extended) deadline of the Editor, so I hope it is reasonably accurate.

Looks like the group had a good weekend; they must have taken the aeroguard. Ed.


