5. FIELD TRIPS:

5.1 Margaret Petridis reported that the May Walpole field trip was very successful (about 30 members attended). The trip was reported in the Walpole Weekly. Orchids seen on the trip include: the Leafless orchid (Praecoxanthus aphyllus), the Hare Orchid (Leporella fimbriata) and several species of Bunny Orchids (Eriochilus).

- 5.2 Margaret outlined the forthcoming field trips as set out in the May bulletin. An email with details will be sent to members before the June meeting.
- 5.3 Members were asked to seek out new locations for the Winter Spider Orchid (*Caladenia drummondii*) and report their finds to Margaret and the registrar.
- 5.4 No field trip is planned for June. Members wishing to look for new locations for Cleopatra's Needles (*Thelymitra apiculata*) should email Kim Hanson who has put together a list of likely areas.

Personal Field Trips:

Members were reminded to complete personal field trip report forms and give them to the secretary so as to help him record where and what orchids you have seen. Further to this members were reminded to complete Donna's Orchid sighting report forms and forward them to the Registrar.

- 5.6 Marina Karyagina: reported seeing Hare Orchids at Warwick Open Space.
- 5.7 Mark Brundrett: Crinkle-leafed Bunny Orchid Eriochilus dilatatus subsp. Undulates. Location?
- 5.8 Clive Pegler: saw Eriochilus dilatatus subsp. multiflorus – Common Bunny Orchid, Location?
- 5.9 Eddy Wajon: saw Eriochilus dilatatus subsp. Magnus, stopping at a random spot along the South Western Highway on the way back from the Walpole trip.
- 5.10 Ross Fox: saw 30 Eriochilus tenuis Slender Bunny Orchid. Fernhill
- 5.11 Eric Swarts: saw Numerous Eriochilus species, Peaceful bay on Bibbulmun track
- 5.12 Bob Steer: saw Eriochilus valens Red-lipped Bunny Orchid and many Caladenia and Cyanicula leaves, Railway Rd, Walpole.
- 5.13 Margaret Petridis and Jeanette Wheatley continued on from the Walpole trip going to Toolina Cove on the Great Australian Bight where they saw the Eastern Bunny (Eriochilus dilatatus subsp.orientalis). Margaret gave the members a very entertaining short presentation of their trip.

CONSERVATION REPORT:

The president presented the Conservation Officer's May report which earlier had been circulated with the attendance book.

- 6.1 Wubin-Mullewa road clearing and widening: Tim Hodgkins has contacted Andrew Brown for comment. It appears that DPaW has an input into this as some areas contain rare and priority flora. However although this road passes through several areas of natural bushland that contain orchids Andrew is unaware of any rare orchids being impacted.
- 6.2 Plan to identify bushland with significant or rich orchid populations with the view of nominating them as a nature reserve at some point in the future. At the April meeting the members expressed the view that this was a worthwhile goal. In order to pursue this objective Tim will need more support from members. Anyone interested in becoming part of a sub-committee should contact Tim.

- 6.3 Ravensthorpe Heavy Haulage By-pass Route:
 Main Roads is investigated options for this route.
 The favoured route north of the town passes through Melaleuca hamata thicket which Eddy thinks is potential habitat for Rhizanthella gardneri. (See May bulletin for Eddy Wajon's article.)
- 6.4 Fracking in the Mid-West Region: Concerns that fracking may damage water tables in the Dongara region were discussed and it was suggested that we should liaise with the CCWA on this matter. The view that it might already be too late to influence any decisions on fracking was expressed.
- 6.5 Kalbarri National Park: There have been reports of mass deaths of plants in the western side of Kalbarri National Park.

7. ITEM OF SPECIAL GENERAL BUSINESS Election of Life members as per the WANOSCG constitution section 10:

HONORARY MEMBER -

A) The members at a properly constituted General or Special Meeting may on the recommendation of the Management Committee appoint Honorary Life Members in recognition of meritorious services rendered to the Group.

The president put the following two motions:

- On behalf of the committee I would like to move that the members at this meeting appoint Noel Hoffman to the position of Honorary Life Member of WANOSCG.
- The motion was seconded by Eric Swartz. Jay Steer spoke to the motion (a transcript will appear in the June Bulletin) and Alex George supported the comments. The members voted unanimously to accept **Noel Hoffman** as an Honorary Life Member of WANOSCG.
- On behalf of the committee I would like to move that the members at this meeting appoint Christine Lock to the position of Honorary Life Member of WANOSCG.

The motion was seconded by Eric Swartz. Jay Steer spoke to the motion (a transcript will appear in the June Bulletin) and Mark Brundrett supported and added to the comments. The members voted unanimously to accept **Christine Lock** as an Honorary Life Member of WANOSCG.

Both recipients thanked the members for bestowing on them the honour of being appointed a Life Member. The President then signed certificates and presented them to Noel and Christine.

8. GENERAL BUSINESS

8.1 Natural Resource Management Project grants: A number of members have enquired whether WANOSCG were going to apply for a Natural Resource Management Project grant in 2014. The matter was discussed at the May Committee meet-

ing and it was felt that there was not enough time to put up a project this year as the closing date was 20 June. To put forward a creditable application the club firstly needed to agree on a project and secondly find a sponsor (and/or an ABN number). It was suggested that WANOSCG should however agree on a suitable project for future applications and investigate the other requirements for a successful application. Eddy Wajon pointed out that when the club undertook the Wheat Belt Project WANOSCG had an ABN number and that it may still be valid. It was suggested that a potential project might come out of the investigations being made into "finding an Orchid rich area to nominate as a reserve". The club will need to set up a sub-committee to look at this idea.

- 8.2 Five Year Plan: The committee is planning to look at what progress has been made with respect to WANOSCG's Five Year Plan with the view of refocussing and potentially revising the plan.
- 8.3 Orchid taxonomy in Australia needs to lift its game:

Life Members

Christine Lock

Christine first joined WANOSCG in 1987 and since then she has accumulated an outstanding record of service to the club. One only has to look at the appendix in the back of the 40th year book to see that Christine's name is listed over and over again year after year. She has represented WANOSCG in 19 significant positions spread over no less than 15 different years and I am sure that there are many other roles that she has performed that are not listed. I would like to point out to you that Christine served the club as:

Treasurer in 97 and 98; Field trip Coordinator in 02, 03, 04; Vice President in 2005, 2006; President in 2007, 2008, 2009, 2010 and Registrar in 09, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14. She has also been a WANOSCG Conservation council rep on a number of occasions.

Although I am relative new comer to WANOSCG I have been lucky enough to see firsthand Christine's outstanding contribution to some highly innovative and significant projects. I would like to briefly mention two such projects that stood out for me. Firstly Christine as president oversaw, the Lottery West Wheatbelt Orchid Rescue Project. This proved not only to be an astounding conservation initiative but it also created a sizable financial buffer for the club. Secondly Christine championed the establishment of the Southern Rivers Group. This extended WANOSCG's underlying values and commitment across the tyranny of distance to orchid lovers on the South Coast. Each of these projects has left a legacy that has strengthened the club's future, albeit in different ways.

Christine so richly deserves her appointment as a Life member.

Noel Hoffman

In his page in the 40th Year book, Noel describes that he, like so many of us, became interested in orchids at a young age. Noel goes on to describe that ever since the advent of affordable motor vehicles, in the late 1950s, there has been a growing interest in understanding and describing the rich tapestry of orchids of SW Australia.

Early on Noel saw the importance of keeping a photographic record of the orchids that he had seen. With discipline and perseverance Noel honed his photographic skills and by the early 80s he had amassed an extensive photographic record of the orchids of South Western Australia.

The lack of an orchid book that adequately illustrated the growing number of recently recognised WA orchids was

proving to be a stumbling block for many budding orchid enthusiasts. Noel, seeing the need for such a book, joined forces with Andrew Brown publishing the first edition of Orchids of South West Australia in 1984. The rest, is as they say, just history.

For the next three decades the words "Hoffman and Brown" have become synonymous with the name of the Bible, that

Orchids appeared in small numbers, then all became dry and stayed unusually warm. Our third trip to the Lowlands/Denmark area in mid June resulted in a wide range of orchid species being found, though the number of orchids was small. On a positive note, the Munda Biddi Track opened up "new" orchid sites in consolidated dunes.

The successful photo presentation night doubled as the AGM at Trevor and Jeans home. All who attended indeed had a very pleasant evening. Shortly afterwards a number of members became grey nomads and headed north, no doubt visiting many an orchid site on the way. Thus, the following field trips northwards to the Stirling Ranges and eastwards to Cape Riche were long in distance and limited in club member numbers as well as limited in the number of orchids being found, both in range of species and numbers found due to the unusual weather patterns. Last year's fire through the Moates Lagoon area did not result in the expected abundance of orchids either.

2013 concluded in a successful short field trip to a local golf course just before Christmas, followed by a shared lunch beside Oyster Harbour, bringing the field trips for the season to a close.

SOUTHERN RIVERS GROUP FIELD TRIP REPORT

Albany Wind Farm 7th June 2014

On a glorious winters morning 22 SRG branch members and visitors met at the Wind Farm to search for Pterostylis orchids. Using the Bibbulmun Track as easy access through the coastal scrub we were soon on our way.

Our first sighting was of Pterostylis rogersii (Curled-tongue Shell), an individual plant which gave everyone the motivation to find more.

Many more indeed were

seen, some as individual isolated plants whilst others were in small colonies.

The next sighting was of Pterostylis sp. 'coastal' (Coastal banded greenhood), tall, robust and very deep green. Smaller, shorter and more greyish and light green Pt. vittata (Banded greenhood) plants were seen too. This leads onto our next species. Although "the books" state that Pt. sp. 'crowded' (Crowded banded greenhood) does not grow as far south as Albany, the crowded deep green of the plants left us all asking questions about the Pt. vittata complex.

Large colonies of Cyrtostylis robusta (Mosquito orchid) were in bud where we turned around for the return walk. Our last sighting for the morning was Prasophyllum sp. 'early' (Scented Autumn Leek). Many were in tight bud with only a few in flower.

For some lucky members the bonus of watching dolphins surfing the waves below really made the morning a perfect field trip. Plans were made for the next two field trips due west, whilst eating lunch out of the breeze beside Princess Royal Harbour.

An Alignment of Western Australian Diuris and Pterostylis names

Three new species of Pterostylis nana named

by Kevin Uhe

As mentioned by Chris French in his informative talk at the April meeting he and David Jones are naming a number of new species in the Pt nana complex.

In the latest edition of the Australian Orchid Review they have named another three nanas. Pterostylis erubescens is the new name for Pt sp 'red flowered' as illustrated in Brown et al on page 365. The type specimen is at the Milyeanup Coast Rd and distribution is from Perth to Albany. It is named from the Latin *erubescens* meaning reddening or blushing in reference to the light red colouring on the upper parts of the flowers.

Pterostylis sp 'karri' is now known as Pterostylis karri as illustrated in Brown et al as Pt sp 'karri forest'. The type is from Johnston Road south of Mandurah and is named after the Karri tree which dominates the usual habitat of this species.

Pterostylis telmata is the new name for Pterostylis sp 'Cape Arid' as illustrated in Brown et al on page 354. The type specimen is from Yaks Swamp which is east of Frenchmans Peak. It grows in swampy areas and is often found standing in water. It is named after the Greek *telmatos* which means standing water, pool or marsh in reference to habitat that the orchid grows in.

All of the above have affinity to Pterostylis pyramidalis in having tall scapes and lacking a distinct rosette. .

MAY/JUNE

Members are encouraged to search for new locations for the **Winter Spider (Caladenia drummondii)** to add to our database during May and June.

This orchid has been found over a large range from Lake King to Nerren Nerren Station, north east of Kalbarri.

It grows in Mallee shrublands and Eucalyptus open woodlands in clay soils and also laterite.

If you are venturing east and north/south east of Perth, stop and look for it. It will be very exciting to find new locations within it's known range and even better, outside of it.

Please advise our Registrar, Christine Lock of any locations you find.

JUNE

The Committee has decided not to have a group field trip in June.

However, we encourage members to head north during this month to search for new locations of **Thelymitra apiculata** (Cleopatra's Needles).

This orchid is 'found between Mogumber and Eneabba, growing amongst low shrubs on the top of low lateritic hills' (Field Guide to the Orchids of Western Australia)

The early flowering **Diuris perialla** may also be found in the area.

Any interested members should contact Kim Hanson

for suggested areas to search. Once you are

familiar with the orchid's preferred habitat, stop and explore any similar areas you come across.

Please advise our Registrar of any locations of these orchids for inclusion in our database.

We will be liaising and co-ordinating with Andrew Brown and DPaW staff in this project to maximise coverage of the area and minimise habitat disturbance.

CORRIGIN AND BEYOND 31ST MAY TO 2ND JUNE 2014

On the way to Corrigin to see *Rhizanthella gardneri* with Andrew Brown, a quick stop at Williams Rd saw *Pterostylis hamiltonii* and sp. 'inland' in flower. A small group of members then met Andrew near Corrigin and went in to look for the Rhizanthella. Robin Campbell and two interested visitors from Corri-

gin also joined us, with Andrew's permission.

Andrew located and partly uncovered a specimen in a known location to show us the orchid and a flurry of photography ensued. Kim Rowcliffe was very excited to find a new specimen for Andrew and took many photos of it. A mature specimen was then spotted poking up through the leaf litter under a marked tree. We all had the opportunity to photograph it in situ before Andrew partly excavated it for more photographs of the composite head of the plant.



After this, Andrew carefully replaced the soil around the flower and leaf litter on the surface and we left the area.

We were all very

pleased and excited to see this rare and endangered orchid, and thank Andrew for giving us the opportunity

Following this, we moved further into the reserve and found Caladenia

After lunch, we explored north of the track and found Pt. scabra in flower, including a patch of pale flowers. C. drummondii, Pt.'rufa' leaves, and Corunastylis tepperi in seed were also seen.

were also in the area, with a few buds, and buds/flowers of Pt. sanguinea were found.



Some members, including Andrew, left us here and a small group then headed out to Pitman's farm in search of Rhizanthella and C. drummondii. We did not find Rhizanthella, noting differences in the soil and leaf litter compared to that in Kunjin NR. We did, however, find a population of 15 plants of C. drummondii in open mallee woodland, which included an unusual pale flower with a pink labellum, yellow tepal tips and pink and green column.

Also in the area were some large clumps of Pterostylis sargentii in bud, Pt. 'rufa', sanguinea and scabra in leaf and Corunastylis tepperi in seed.

Some members stayed overnight in Corrigin and we met at the hotel that night for a delicious evening meal and drink to celebrate a great day.

Next morning we met just after 9am outside the hotel and were joined by Lyn Alcock from Narrogin and her two friends from S.A. Jeanette, Urszula



and Marina had gone out to the Wildflower Drive with Robin earlier and found 12 plants of C. drummondii, before meeting up with us.

We headed out in a small convoy to the West Bendering NR near Dickinson Rd, where we had discovered a population of C. drummondii in 2010. At the end of May that year we found 38 flowers and 12 plants in seed.

We re-located the population of tiny flowers, some only 4cm high, and were excited to find a new sub-population about 30m to the west of the original one. All in all, we found 77 plants, with 12 flowers, 4 finished flowers (no seedpod), 13 seedpods, 10 eaten off (with fresh 'roo droppings nearby) and 38 seedlings or non -flowering leaves.

Also in the area were large populations of Pt. scabra, Pt. sp.'inland' and 'rufa' leaves, and small Thelymitra leaves.

On a quest to find new populations of C. drummondii, we then headed to the Bendering NR on the east side of the Kondinin Narembeen Rd. After missing the turn on the left due to a name change on the road, we stopped at likely habitat on the SW edge of the reserve. After about 15 minutes, we heard an excited shout from Urszula..."drummondii!!" In the nearby area we found 21 plants, with 19 in flower and 2 leaves.

Pt. sanguinea and Pt. sargentii were also found in leaf and bud here, as well as Pt. scabra, Pt. sp'inland' and Eriochilus d ssp undulatus in seed.

We re-traced our tracks and took White Rd (named Bendering Reserve Rd in R&T) through the middle of the reserve. We stopped at some low granite rocks near the eastern boundary and found Eriochilus in flower, seed and leaf nearby. I headed west to a raised area on the roadside with open eucalypt woodlands and excitedly yelled..."drummondii!!' as I saw three small flowers of the target species.

Everyone converged on the area and we found 30 plants on the north side of the road, with 23 in flower and 4 plants on the south side. Interestingly, some of the plants on the north side were growing under sheaok and also out in the open in red gravelly clay soil.

Most of the party left us here to head home and all agreed it had been an interesting and rewarding trip.

Kevin and I camped out overnight after failing to find any more winter spiders that afternoon. On the Monday morning we explored the reserve around Mt Bayly without success, though did find some Pterostylis rosettes.

At lunch time we stopped to look for C. drummondii in the Mt Hampton NR where we had found a new population last year. We located the population and counted 40 plants, with 29 in flower. Plant height was 4cm – 8cm, so they were very difficult to see. Also found was a large colony of the often co-occuring Pt. scabra, Pt. 'rufa' and Thelymitra leaves.

We headed for home after a very productive and satisfying weekend.

INTREPID ADVENTURE TO TOOLINA COVE: 4TH - 11TH MAY 2014

After realising last year that the Eastern Bunny (Eriochilus dilatatus subsp. orientalis) was the only named white bunny orchid we had not seen, Kevin and I decided to plan a trip to Toolina Cove on the Great Australian Bight this year to look for it.

We contacted Andrew Brown for information and then asked other WANOSCG members to join us. We were pleased to have Ian Greeve and Jeanette Wheatley agree to come and felt much safer in a small convoy of 2 vehicles.

Following the weekend field trip to Walpole on 3rd/4th May, we headed to Gull Rock Rd out of Albany and found 15 flowering plants of Eriochilus valens. We then drove to Jerramungup and stayed overnight in the caravan park.

Next morning we drove to the Stokes NP in search of the summer burn and found it east of the inlet off Farrell Rd. We did not find any early orchids there but thought it could be interesting later in the season.

After staying the night in Esperance, we headed east along Fisheries Rd and stopped at Condingup where we found Eriochilus dilatatus subsp dilatatus and Praecoxanthus aphyllus flowering in the bush on the corner. We drove to Condingup Peak for a lunch stop and found Eriochilus pulchellus, dilatatus subsp dilatatus and Leporella fimbriata in flower.

After lunch we headed to the Cape Arid NP in search of two more summer burns. We saw a burn on Tagon Peninsula in the distance but could not access it. Near Mt Arid, the track to the west where the burn had been was closed, so we headed south over a sandy and, at times, rough track over granites to the Thomas Fishery beach to camp.

In the morning we saw a glorious sunrise from the beach and then found Eriochilus in flower on the coastal granites on our way out. We headed north to Parmango Rd via the Muntz NR where we found Eriochilus dilatatus subsp undulatus during our morning tea stop.

The Parmango Rd was very rough and slow going. We stopped at Breeborinia Rock for lunch and found Eriochilus flowering, dilatatus subsp dilatatus and pulchellus. After stopping to explore homestead ruins just off the road, we arrived in Balladonia at 5pm. We decided to stay the night in the motel and enjoyed a good meal, a comfortable bed and hot showers.

This proved to be a good decision as it rained overnight and was still raining when

we set off in the morning, heading east to the start of the Toolina track. We went in on the eastern entrance and splashed through muddy water in the low points on the grassy plain. The habitat became Mallee woodland as we came to higher areas of limestone on the track.

We found Pygmy orchids (Corunastylis tepperi) at our lunch stop and then about 4kms from the coast, (after about 70kms on the track) we stopped to check a plant and found some bun-

nies on the east side. A survey of the area found 32 plants, with 23 in flower.

We also found some small banded greenhoods in bud in the area and assume they are Pterostylis sp. 'Eyre'.

A further 4kms brought us in on a rough limestone track to the coastal cliffs which were covered in low windswept bushes. We did not find any orchids in this area, so after tak-







ing photos of the spectacular cliffs and Toolina Cove, we headed back north to camp.

In the morning we found C. tepperi and banded greenhoods near the campsite. A few sturdy greenhoods were in flower and ID as Pterostylis sanguinea. We returned to a spot just north of the previous bunny location and found more under shrubs in the mallee woodland. The population was spread over 200-300m on the eastern side of the track and overall we counted 80 in flower, 11 in seed and 21 non-flowering leaves. We only noted one in bud, so felt we had gone in at the ideal time of the year.

On the way back, we camped at Frasers Range Station and the Breakaways on the Hyden Norseman

Rd. We found Corunastylis tepperi near both. We called in to Disappointment and McDermid Rocks and found early leaves of Thelymitra and Pterostylis species.

Our last orchiding stop was at the Karlgarin NR west of Hyden where we found Corunastylis tepperi in bud, flower and seed, a few Eriochilus dilatatus subsp. undulatus flowers and our first Caladenia drummondii for the season. It was a great bonus for the trip and for Mother's Day (11th May).



FIELD TRIP REPORT: WALPOLE 3RD AND 4TH MAY 2014

Over 30 members met south of Manjimup on Saturday 3rd May and followed Trip Leader Andrew Brown to a site along the South Western Highway where Praecoxanthus aphyllus (Leafless) and Eriochilus dilatatus subsp multiflorus (Common Bun-

ny) were found.

The convoy next headed to Broke Inlet Rd where we explored on and around two large granite outcrops. On the first rock we found a large population of Eriochilus pulchellus (Granite Bunny) in bud and flower and near the second we found Prasophyllum sp. 'early' (Scented Autumn Leek) and Pterostylis vittata (Banded Greenhood).

After lunch we drove to Railway Parade to explore the large burnt area north-west of Walpole. A population of Eriochilus valens (Red-lipped Bunny) found two weeks previously was shown to participants who had the chance to photograph a rarely seen species. A few other Eriochilus flowers were found in the area and these were thought to be a small form of E. dilatatus subsp multiflorus (Common Bunny).



Further east along the road in unburnt bush, a few Leporella fimbriata (Hare), Common Bunnies and Scented Autumn Leeks were found, as well as a finished flower of the Leafless orchid.

The last stop for the day was along Mandalay Beach Rd where specimens of Eriochilus dilatatus subsp dilatatus (White Bunny) were found.

Participants then headed off to their various accommodation locations in and around Walpole for the night. Six members called on local orchid identity Gloria Jackson to deliver her copy of the 40th Anniversary

book and a bottle of wine, and were asked to stay for a cup of tea.

We met again in Walpole on the Sunday morning and headed out to The Knoll where Andrew showed us some specimens of Eriochilus dilatatus subsp magnus (Easter Bunny). Andrew was disappointed at the small size of the plants this year, presumably from the lack of early rain in the area. Last year one plant had had 20 flowers and a large, broad leaf but this year it was only half the size, with 8-10 flowers and a much smaller leaf.

Our next stop was out at Sandy Beach where we were shown a couple of specimens of a luteal form of Leporella fimbriata. One flower was com-









pletely pale green, while the other had a touch of purplish colour on the labellum.

We returned to the burnt area west of Walpole along Angove Rd and stopped near a low rock. In the area we found more small specimens of the Common Bunny, the Easter Bunny and Leafless orchid.

Most people headed home from this point but a small group headed further east to a large granite outcrop north of Ficifolia Rd where they found another population of the Granite Bunny in flower and bud.

Thank you to all the participants who attended. It was wonderful to have so much interest and enthusiasm for our first group field trip of the year.
